Vehicle Emergency Item Check List

While most would probably say that they already have the majority of these items on their vehicle for emergency situations, it's always wise to go through everything and make sure all items are in good condition and not missing (especially with winter upon us). Even non-perishable foods go bad, medicines in first aid kits expire and those extra clothes you may keep on hand might have fit two years ago, but a few extra holes have been added to that belt loop over time. Additionally, some of the items listed may not have even been considered and might be a good idea to add to your vehicle's emergency supplies now.

You never know when you may be stranded on the side of the road for an extended period of time alone, stuck in a town overnight unexpectedly, or in need of emergency medical attention. The following suggested items may help ease these unpredictable situations.

Travel Pack/Backpack Containing:

- Non Perishable Food/Snacks
- Water
- Emergency Blankets
- Flashlight
- Extra Batteries
- First Aid Kit
- Extra Prescription Medications
- Extra Cash – For Food and Lodging
- Portable Cell Phone Charger
- Medical History and Insurance Information
- Contacts List: Family, Doctor and Company or Broker
- Pad of Paper & Pen/Pencil
- Book and/or Word Puzzles (To Ease Boredom)
- Extra Set of Clean Warm Clothing
- Extra Pair of Shoes/Galoshes
- Travel Hygiene Products
- Tissue/Toilet Paper

When a vehicle ends up on the side of the road unexpectedly, or something has to be fixed during

routine inspection while traveling, the suggested items below may be found useful to keep your vehicle running.

Tool Box:

- Duct Tape
- Electrical Tape
- WD-40
- Assorted Screw Drivers
- Cable Cutters/Crimpers
- Ratcheting/Socket Set
- Wrench Set
- Crescent Wrench
- Pry/Crow Bar
- Hammer/Rubber Mallet
- Compact/Fold-up Shovel
- Other Items Specific to Vehicle's Needs

No matter what you may, or may not, keep on board it's always good to treat these supplies just as you would routine maintenance on your vehicle. Emergency supplies should be routinely assessed every 6-12 months. If any supplies are used or expire in the interim, replace them as soon as possible.

- Extra batteries stored outside of a flashlight can last up to 7 years.
- It may be useful to note expiration dates for perishable items on a calendar or in your phone's calendar to remind you that they need replacing.
- If you have a passenger traveling with you it's always good to make sure you have enough supplies for two people, as well as share where emergency contact and medical information can be found if something happens to you, the driver.
- Add emergency contacts to your cell phone as I.C.E. contacts (In Case of Emergency)
